NEPAL SHORT REFLECTIONS By Isabelle, ENT Residency

I am thankful for the opportunity to serve in mobile clinics in Nepal in 2017 with Touch International. Having served in a number of such clinics before, I have come to the point of wondering whether they really made a difference. Was it just touch and go? Did it really help make life better for the local community? This time as I came to serve, I found myself not being able to do much - no ability to follow up on chronic diseases, no way to list patients for surgery, no "stronger" medications to provide. And these people walked for 2-3 hours, or even half a day just to consult me.

So I decided to give all that I can for each one of them. To hear their stories, to give medication where I can, and to say a silent prayer especially for those who have chronic pains and there was nothing I could do. Thereafter the locals shared with me that the mobile clinics really made a difference. For these people usually hide their pain and suffering, but this gave them an avenue to come out into the open to share - and that is where healing begins.

The local youth also shared that they were encouraged to see us serving their people, and that has inspired them to want to pursue further studies in order to be able to implement initiatives to improve the lives of their fellow citizens.

And so I choose to continue to serve, whether it's locally or overseas, one heartbeat at a time.
