














# Greetings From Our

### ACP Chair

Last year 2023, we witnessed our researchers increasing their competitive funding success at the National level and the number of publications compared to 2022.

The pipeline of inventions from several of our researchers including A/Prof Sng Ban Leong and Hairil Rizal Bin Abdullah have also been highly visible in the mass media.

This speaks volumes about the progress of our specialty in being able to bring our innovations to the market as well as to translate our research to clinical practice. The growth in the number and quality of our young researchers brings into focus the importance of reinforcing the support structure to maximize their potential.

Our historical focus on forming and strengthening partnerships has generated some of our most successful collaborations in research, education, innovation and quality improvement and this has gained greater significance in the push towards healthierSG and population health.

The examples of successful projects share a common thread of being achieved on the back of strong collaboration with external stakeholders and we intend to maintain our focus on supporting these partnerships.

Many of our ACP's leaders have benefited from our relationship with Duke Anaesthesiology, including working on joint publications.

A/Prof Chan Yew Weng is the convener for this year's World Congress of Anaesthesiology in Singapore and we will organize a networking session with the Duke faculty when they here.

We are also working on partnerships with Duke pain medicine, surgical critical care as well as perioperative medicine to identify the synergies that we can establish in these domains.

This year in January we have sent a perioperative team to Duke and we will be sending a pain medicine team as well to Duke to further strengthen our ties.

The feedback scores for our medical students and residents have been benchmarked against national averages and in this regard, our residency program has consistently maintained the scores above that. Our educators' efforts have seen them secure the best ACGME-I Programme Award as well as AMEI Golden Apple Awards in 2023.

The Clinical Quality & Services pillar led by Dr Teo Li Ming and her team has been working on building the infrastructure to implement evidence-based practices and the experience garnered will be invaluable when she leads the EPIC migration workgroup.

Moving on to establishing a bigger footprint nationally, the team led by Dr Diana Chan secured approval from the Singhealth Medical Board to set up the Pain Singhealth Duke-NUS Disease Centre.

The Philanthropy group led by Dr June Goh has been working on multiple fronts. This has been an important source of support for our emerging researchers through the philanthropy grant calls leveraging on this.

Last year's ACP Academic Day and Retreat brought together faculty members of the various departments to share their work and future plans.

During last year's Singhealth Duke-NUS Strategy Retreat, our leaders reaffirmed our aim to be a world-leading Academic Health System to improve lives.

This will not be possible unless we build our specialty's future on the foundations of education that is based on best evidence, research that translates to clinical practice, quality improvement that leverages on implementation science and leadership that transforms individuals and teams.

It is vital that we build the internal communities of practice and networks that are essential for success in this highly competitive arena.

To the newer ACP faculty, make use of this opportunity to tap on your senior colleagues' wealth of experience. For the senior faculty, provide your feedback, share your experience and better still introduce them to your network and be an advocate for our younger colleagues.

I wish to thank the newsletter committee led by editor Dr Siow Yew Nam and the admin team led by Gary Ong for creating the content for this newsletter that is the voice of the ACP faculty.

Our Anaesthesiology ACP Academic Day on July 22, 2023. It was our first in-person event since 2019. Attended by close to 60 faculty. The event provided the opportunity to take-stock of the academic achievements for the year, welcome our R1 residents, share our experiences.

The day started with a friendly welcome from our Academic Chairperson, setting a positive tone for the session. Three interesting presentations on QI projects, led by our Residents, talking about Reduction of Fresh Frozen Plasma (FFP) wastage in Sengkang General Hospital, The Creation of "Are you TOF enough?" & Match in Time.



Dr. Tham Shu Qi delivered a captivating presentation on streamlining operations in the Operating Theatre for improved efficiency. Subsequently, we enjoyed an introduction to welcome our new Residents.







The event featured abstracts and highlighted the prestigious SRTDA award for 2022. The 2022 SRTDA awardee, Dr Lynn Chen presented her SRTDA journey in 2023, from her leadership course at Harvard T.H.Chan School of Public Health to her observership at Tufts Medical Centre. She further explained that during this trip, she learned how to assume leadership during a health crisis, managing dynamic shift in balance of power in workers' favour, mastering conflict resolution and negotiation skills and understanding the concept of Metaleadership.

Dr Tham ended her presentation by giving an introduction of the ANAES ACP SRTDA programme, which can be summarized as to allow young anaesthetists to learn to observe and learn best practices from a different healthcare system, to spur academic interest of the young Anaesthesiologists, to strengthen the residents-ACP engagement and attract the next generation of Anaesthesiologists to contribute to the ACP and lastly to foster collaboration between young anaesthetist and other Academic Medical Centres.





Next, the awardees of the Anaesthesiology ACP Pilot Research Grant shared their projects through their video presentation to the crowd.



Sigmund Freud – physician, psychoanalyst ... pain specialist? Who knew that the father of psychoanalysis was also the first person to utilize cocaine as a local anaesthetic in 1884? That fact, and much more, was learned during the inaugural World Day of Regional Anaesthesia and Pain Medicine held at Changi General Hospital (CGH) and supported by the Department of Anaesthesia and Surgical Intensive Care on the Saturday, January 27 2024. The event had faculty from all the clusters (Singhealth, NHG, NUHS) across the island.

The meeting, with a theme of "Joining Hands for a Pain Free Future Worldwide" was initiated by European Society of Regional Anaesthesia and Pain Therapy (ESRA), and Sister Societies AFSRA, ASRA Pain Medicine, AOSRA and LASRA. They had sent out messages from all the respective societies' presidents and some recorded webinars from eminent speakers. The local program was a day long mix of lectures, hands-on skills station on volunteers and an interactive quiz. We had delegates from various healthcare clusters ranging from MOs in Anaesthesia to specialists.

The day began with a talk by Dr Lim Yean Chin (CGH) on diaphragm-sparing blocks for shoulder surgery, with particular attention being given to suprascapular and costoclavicular blocks. Dr Wong Wan Yi (TTSH) followed with a lecture on erector spinae plane (ESP) blocks in spine surgery, before Dr Sanjay Bajaj (KTPH) gave a thorough rundown on the various chest wall blocks. Dr Timothy Lam (NUH) then gave a thoughtful speech on the role and perception of regional anaesthesia, prior to a talk on abdominal wall blocks. Dr Prit Singh (CGH) ended the morning series of lectures with a call for more Point of Care Ultrasound (POCUS) to aid in the assessment of airway and for aspiration risk.





After a break with coffee and croissants, participants proceeded to practice their ultrasound skills at the various stations. There was an eager air in the event hall as participants keenly sought advice from instructors, before jabbing ultrasound probes onto the patient volunteers. An esoteric post-lunch quiz was valiantly attempted by the 35 participants for the prize of 3 free ESRA Prague 2024 tickets, before the day finished with 2 more stations and a closing session.



As the day closed and we went our separate ways, I felt privileged to have had the opportunity to learn with, and from, generous colleagues and friends. It was also enriching to meet colleagues from different clusters and exchange ideas on practices in regional anaesthesia. Through these meetings, we build bonds and join hands, helping each other along a path towards a pain free future worldwide.


- UP TO \$10,000/PROJECT IN CLINICAL/ TRANSLATIONAL RESEARCH, HSR, MEDTECH, AND AI
- PROJECT DURATION: 1 YEAR (1 JUL 24 30 JUN 25)

Eligibility

- ASSOCIATE CONSULTANTS, SHARP RESIDENTS, REGISTRARS, RESIDENT PHYSICIANS, AND MEDICAL OFFICERS
- HAVE A MENTOR WHO MUST BE AN ANAES CONSULTANT AND ABOVE FROM THE SAME DEPARTMENT
- CURRENTLY WORKING IN AN ANAES ACP DEPARTMENT IN SGH. KKH, CGH OR SKH
- DO NOT HOLD ANY PREVIOUS OR EXISTING GRANT AMOUNTING OVER \$20,000
- EACH PI IS ALLOWED TO SUBMIT ONE PROPOSAL PER FUNDING CYCLE
- EACH PI IS ONLY ALLOWED TO HAVE UP TO 2 NON-CONCURRENT ANAES ACP PILOT RESEARCH GRANTS
